Summarize your projects' overall goals and/or intentions for students.

The Middle School Early Success (MSES) program was designed to include underserved middle school students in schools with high numbers of Latino, low income, and/or first generation students. The pre-college outreach program sought to improve access, college enrollment and success rates for the target population.

Our primary goal is for students to feel invited and welcomed on our campus. Our intention is that students feel a sense of belonging and experience the sense of community we have here. One of our learning outcomes was for students to see themselves as college going individuals. In order to see themselves at this particular campus, our staff must be welcoming, encouraging, fun, and engaging. Post-surveys reflected that 100% of students did feel very welcomed and excited to be here.

One of the secondary goals is to help middle school students develop a college-bound mindset to improve the likelihood they will prepare for and pursue post-secondary education. In 2018-19, we aligned our intended outcomes and project activities to match the Integrated Student Success goals, continuing to focus on access for underrepresented middle school students.

Please describe the specific activities supported by SEA funds.

SEA funding allowed us to hire two Student Ambassadors to support the MSES program. They were an integral part of the program, serving on student panels, providing campus tours, and compiling attendance totals. Faculty presentations such as chemistry demonstrations and career education presentations provided by our Career Education Coordinator engaged students and encouraged them to think about future college plans.

Middle school students were also introduced to campus resources, support services and academic programs. A parent component allowed parents to hear more about the MSES program from SRJC Student Ambassadors.

Approximately 522 middle school students were served during the 2018-19 school year. The project is creating a pipeline for future SRJC students.
