The Puente Program mission is to increase the number of educationally underserved students who enroll in college, earn their degrees, return to communities as mentors, and hold leadership roles in their communities.

Our transfer model has three component; English instruction, counseling, and mentorship. Our overall goals for our students who participate in the Puente Program on the Santa Rosa Campus is to receive all three services.

Please describe the specific activities supported by SEA funds.

This year the SEA funds have been used in the following manner:

- 1. Funded our Puente Statewide Motivational Conference at UC Merced in November 2019. It paid for transportation, uniforms for students, and their dinner. The uniform is a t-shirt that was used to promote SRJC presence and pride at the conference as there were 20+ other Puente programs represented at the conference. These t-shirts have also been worn throughout the year for program and student club tabling, outreach presentations and other Puente sponsored events.
- 2. Visit to CSU, Chico in partnership with the Transfer Center. We are sharing the cost for transportation with the Transfer Center and Petaluma Puente.
- 3. Lastly, we will be purchasing outreach material to help promote our program on the Santa Rosa campus. We have been invited to multiple conferences and events this year and have very little materials. This will help promote our college and program.

Due to COVID, we were unable to use funds on our remaining fieldtrips and therefore, used the remaining funds for outreach materials.


Share any highlights or achievements your group had during the year – refer to the following data if applicable.




Lastly, being in Puente, our students have had many opportunities to be in leadership roles and have leadership experiences.
